From the Passage:

It was found that adults watching a film of a crying infant were more likely to hear the cry as expressing frustration if they believed the infant was a boy, and as plaintive or expressing insecurity if they believed the infant was a girl.

In a similar experiment, adults judged a 24-hour-old baby as bigger if they believed it to be a boy, and finer-

featured if they believed it to be a girl

Paraphrased Answer:

The adults treat the cry of male infants as their anger over a matter while the cry of a female infant is seen as their call for protection. Similarly, adults also see that the male baby to bigger in size as compared to a female baby.

A woman's time is traditionally controlled by the continual needs of other people.
